THUMBS AT THE BENCH

Dohrman Crawford sent along the following photo of his warp-preventing storage technique for his models. All you need are some small pieces of foam and rubber bands. As we all know, this and other ways are especially useful in the scale arena in keeping everything aligned, particularly at the tail feathers.

Let me add another, which is hardly a secret and in much use by many others. That is, simply don't use nitrate of any kind on stabs and fins because the nitrate (even the non-taughtening) inputs continuing warping pressures. Rather, use any of the rattle can spray clear lacquers, available in the vandal section of many hardware and craft outlets. Matte finish is better in appearance for FAC work. Two or three thin spray coats work fine. The weight difference is minimal. I hear the acrylic variety works, too, but I've never tried it.

Dohrman also sent along a photo of his freshly built P-18 kit by Retro RC. He put some air under it a Christ Chapel, and it's a good flier. He compliments the kit's engineering, ease of construction and wood selection. Get yours today! The Retro RC website is an easy google.

The ever busy Josh Finn sends along his newly completed indoor HLG, a real beauty with all the up-to-date materials and hardware. Just look at the photo, good grief! I don't recall the kit manufacturer or its country of origin, but I do remember the name was incomprehensible and impossible to spell and from some country I'd never heard of.
